Design ≠ Art?

The lead question of Design City 2016 – aims to challenge our perceptions and opinions of the world around us. The biennial's title, *design is (not) art*, is intended to be ambiguous, thought-provoking and attract attention. In this hyper-connected world, is it even possible to differentiate design from art? Can something be both art and design? This area of uncertainty is precisely what this year's biennial aims to explore.

In the spirit of 'design thinking' and transcultural exchange, Design City 2016 brings together designers with original and inventive ideas about the function and purpose of design. A range of exhibitions will highlight pioneering concepts, and will investigate the blurred lines between art and design, the power of urban design and its benefits for a city such as Luxembourg. From 27 April to 22 May 2016, the Design City biennial will stir emotions, pose resonant questions and provoke creative ideas, as well as offer many enriching discussions.

design is (not) art: Anna Loporcaro vs. Jan Glas

While Anna Loporcaro (curator of the Design City biennial) is intrigued by the blurred boundaries between design and art, Jan Glas (design consultant) doesn't consider design to be art.

However, Jan Glas believes that 'one needs an artistic approach when trying to find solutions with design'. Some of their views on design might be different, but Loporcaro and Glas clearly see eye-to-eye when it comes to the importance of design for our culture, the city of Luxembourg, and to the question of *Nation Branding*.

FABRICA AND TALKING THINGS

RE-DESIGNING A STREET'S REPUTATION

Date: 27.04.2016 - 22.05.2016 Place: Rue de Strasbourg

If the spirit of a city is defined by its streets, one cannot help but become concerned about the deteriorating situation around Luxembourg City's train station, especially concerning the Rue de Strasbourg. An increase in crime and prostitution has been unsettling for most residents and their discontent is growing. What are the street's current problems and can design be an answer?

FABRICA

Fabrica is an Italian-based communication research centre also offering courses to designers that aim to specialise in various communication-related fields, such as photography, journalism and design. In the context of Design City, Fabrica's mission is to act as the consultant for a new visual landmark for the Rue de Strasbourg and its surrounding area.

"... (dot dot dot)" is a participative project by Fabrica for Mudam to enliven Rue de Strasbourg during Design City-LXBG Biennale, from April 27th - 22nd May. Fabrica's creative team explores light and dark, individual and community, creating a new, inclusive, universal language for this multicultural street, transforming negative perception into positive content.

Using the humble dot as a simultaneous metaphor of an individual within a greater community, we design a system that becomes a way to connect, draw or write - a way to communicate, no matter your language, age, or origin. This allows evolution, and adapts to different needs and expressions, from children to shopkeepers to passers-by.

Through collaboration with both residents and visitors, the result is a pathway of dots adorning the street, leading to the facade of the Community Center, forming a collective voice which generates meaningful and visual content ...

TALKING THINGS

In close collaboration with local residents and shopkeepers from the Rue de Strasbourg, the French design group Talking Things will give this infamous street – which has been brought into disrepute over the past few years – a new voice. By creating a journal, the street's charm, its multicultural community and history will all be revealed.

Rue de Strasbourg, near the central station, has been for many years the most infamous district in Luxembourg City. The Paris-based design agency Talking Things however describes the street in a completely different and refreshing way, presenting an alternative view of its inhabitants.

With the aim of highlighting positive and little-known aspects of the street, Talking Things has invited shopkeepers and residents to create a newspaper. During one week, a participatory editorial office enabled residents to share their love of the area. As a result, the story of the street and its shops, as well as the multicultural influence present in the community have been depicted in the newspaper. In order to enable the residents and the City of Luxembourg to continue the journal, the Talking Things team has developed an easily accessible editorial process.

Distributed in the station district and in other parts of the city, the newspaper aims to imply citizens in giving this street a new voice. To complete the journal, the team will install a temporary radio in the corner of the place of Strasbourg: it will offer and overview and cover each hour of the day. All residents are invited to share their stories about the street. At the end of Design City, on May 21st and 22nd, those stories will complete the journal and a new version will be printed and distributed at Mudam and by the partners of the biennial.



AGAINST ROUTINE!

Sensity, a 'design consultancy' based in Luxembourg, has developed a new project, #lookinbetween, to help you to discover the hidden beauty of Luxembourg's station district. Independent curator and author Hans Fellner will take you on a special curated tour around this part of the city.

Have you ever just stood still for a while to observe the subtle play between architecture, design, art and everyday life?

Well you should - especially in the Station district. Hans Fellner, in cooperation with Guido Wolff and Marcel Befort, has created a new project to entice you to do just that - to make remarkable discoveries in this district.

Looking for an unusual perspective?

#lookinbetween is an open adventure; an invitation to wander through one of the capital's most diverse areas. Through a Webapp, Fellner will share his observations of interesting, contrasting or strange sites within public space. The project incites the public to participate, by taking photographs and posting them under #lookinbetween in the social media.

But what is public space exactly?

It is everything I see, even if it's a second floor window', says Fellner. This project is an invitation not only to take the time to observe but also to get closer and feel grounded in the urban space that we share. #lookinbetween integrates itself in Strollology, a science developed by Swiss sociologist Lucius Burckhardt (1995-2003), which aims to extend the environmental consciousness; to not only see what is obvious, but what happens in-between the unconscious glimpses of the sites we encounter daily.

ON READING BUILDINGS AND THE SPACE IN-BETWEEN:

AN INTERVIEW WITH HANS FELLNER, CURATOR OF THE PROJECT #LOOKINBETWEEN

Jessica Oé: The title of this year's Design City Luxembourg biennial is called *design* is (not) art. Is design art in your eyes?

Hans Fellner: No. Design can be art or can be close to it, but I think there should be a separation. Design sometimes makes use of art and vice versa. They often meet in the same cultural environment. But artists and designers both want to be perceived as such and not be mistaken for the other.

JO: What impact does design have on your life? HF: I am a very visual and sensitive person. Design has always been with me but I see it as a part of the whole.

JO: What does the biennial mean to you?

HF: It's a long-term project. Of course we are not a traditional design-oriented city or society, especially because we live in a city where a variety of important cultures come together. We are still on the lookout, which can be beneficial for this biennial. We need to explore, accept and further develop what we don't yet have. Anyway, I'm glad to be participating.

JO: What is design in public space?

HF: Public space has always been a place where you can creatively let off steam to your heart's content. Design in public space is very important for orientation and visual identity. As for me, I do miss the old buses from Luxembourg City, for example. Nowadays you don't know whether you are looking at a tourist bus or an urban bus that will take you somewhere through the local traffic. On top of that, design is needed to make cities more comfortable and more useful.

JO: Do you believe that design can bring change to the area around the train station? HF: Improving that area of the city is of public interest and yet I think putting it into practice is not that easy. In my eyes, the train station

area is our most urban space because of its diversity and discontinuity. There is so much to see. But not only positive sights - poor families live there, and drug dealers, alcoholics and prostitutes are hanging around the streets. This is all part of reality. I think that the different approaches and projects that Design City supports will at least change some points of view and perspectives. This is what I am also aiming for with my project...

JO: ... #lookinbetween

HF: Exactly. Being the curator of the project #lookinbetween, I have selected areas of the station district that lie in the field of interest where design, art, public space - maybe even architecture or well-known landmarks intersect. I have my own definition of public space, one which contains everything you can perceive with your eyes, regardless of whether we are talking about privately-owned buildings and spaces or not. When I find myself in a public space, I also consider, for instance, the windows of a private home as a part of it. All in all, I intend to make people read buildings and the spaces in-between. The initiators of this project, Guido Wolff and Marcel Befort from the design consultancy Sensity, have fed these chosen spots into a Webapplication, which guides the smartphone users to the spots that I have identified.

JO: Do you think Luxembourg City invests enough into design?

HF: I'm not sure. They keep on trying but nothing has been finalised yet. Luxembourg City needs a corporate identity. Every part of the city, every gate or rubbish bin should remind you that you are in Luxembourg City. Of course this should happen on more of a subconscious level. Design should be *invisible* in a way. However, those are the little things that make you feel at home.

A PATH THROUGH THE FOURTH DIMENSION:

A CONVERSATION WITH LEIF HEIDENREICH, DESIGNER

Date: 27.04.2016 - 22.05.2016, 24h/24h Place: Footbridge connecting the central train station with Bonnevoie, Luxembourg

Leif Heidenreich was born in Germany. He is known for his experimental design in exhibition and domestic spaces as well as for spatial dramaturgy and staging. For Design City he will collaborate with sound designer Alex Brown to create a 'fourth dimension' on the footbridge leading from Central Station to the Bonnevoie district.

Jessica Oé: How would you describe your design process?

Leif Heidenreich: I approach each project in a very formative way. Initially, I try to find out what its requirements and my expectations are, and I then pare this down to its most rudimentary aspects. This is the framework I impose upon myself. The process is certainly a recognisable leitmotif in my work. My design is often reduced to its core and structure.

JO: How did you develop your concept for the 'temporary' footbridge?

LH: The site is very interesting. I have visited it a couple of times, at different times of the day, alone and also with Alex Brown. We wanted to develop an audio-installation that will intensify the atmosphere by drawing impressions from train and station spaces.

JO: What do you want to accomplish with your design?

LH: It is my intention to sharpen the passer-by's perception of their surroundings. The project aims to surprise and provoke a response. I want people to just stop for a moment and to be startled by what they experience.

DZIGNING THE TIMELINE

INCLUSIVE DESIGN FOR THE ELDERLY

Date: 27.04.2016 - 22.05.2016, opening 30.04.2016, 11.30am

Place: LUCA, Luxembourg Center for Architecture

The Israeli-Luxembourgish initiative, *INclusive by Dzign*, uses design as a tool to promote intergenerational and cross-cultural understanding. Developed by Patrizia Luchetta (president of INclusive by DZIGN asbl), this exhibition project comes up with solutions aimed to improve the living space of elderly people. Servior – a Luxembourg-based company providing care for the elderly and the Comas Design School in Tel Aviv, are all part of *DZigning the TimeLine: INclusive Design for the Elderly*.

Adopting an empathetic approach to design, nine young design students from the Comas Design School have considered the daily challenges and realities faced by the elderly. Subsequently, they have developed innovative concepts for Servior's social-gerontological groups - for example, by creating living spaces geared towards the specific needs of those suffering from dementia. To help the young designers in their mission, Anna Bugugnani (an expert in design strategy), Lucie Cahu (graphic designer), Lynn Schammel and Giacomo Piovan (of Socialmatter), organised a series of 'empathy' workshops held at several Servior sites in Luxembourg - recognizing the importance and need 'to take on social responsibility and raise awareness'.

When asked what the project meant to them, the students explained: 'Both as students and as people, the project drastically changed our understanding of the elderly'. Conceived by David Richiuso (deFact Studio) and Lucie Cahu (Hello World), the exhibition *DZigning the TimeLine* features five projects and documentation following the exchange between the students, the elderly and the medical profession of Servior.

LE BRUIT DES BONBONS

THE ASTOUNDING EYES OF SYRIA

The second instalment of the installation *Le bruit des bonbons – The Astounding Eyes of Syria* is now on view at Casino Luxembourg – Forum d'art contemporain. It deals with the power of the language of confectionery and of everyday objects. The work explores the distillations of history and the durability of our legacies from the past. While sweets are a universal communicator that humanise relations between individuals, here it is the driver that has the power to bring people together, to pass on and to recollect. It is through Syrian confectionery that the installation evokes and shares memories that live through time and survive the horrors of war. It weaves both fictional and real connections with time and the world based on shared traditions.

A great many Syrians today find themselves again through their living heritage, collective and individual memories of which initiate the survival of something intangible that cannot be broken, reduced or forgotten. The Louloupti is a real small confection that reminds us of the Qabaqib Ghawar, miniature Syrian clogs made from sugar, the Al-Hamidiyah souk and Booza which now more than ever live in the memories of Syrians in Jordan, France, Canada, Italy and elsewhere. These confections, word objects and links mend our vision and awaken our ability to see and take action. Conceived by Benjamin Loyauté, these narrative sweets are a way of conveying a message, agents of human relations. For centuries the Arab peoples have included sugar in the pharmacopoeia. In the 16th century sugar was sold by apothecaries. Sweets had their virtues that history has not taken up again since.

Discovered in Syria by Max Mallowan in 1937, the 'Eye Idol' is a sculpture that still intrigues and whose function has never been truly decided. The design of the small Louloupti figures based on this archaeological find is as speculative as it is tangible. In Damask rose meringue, it may also serve the function of extending time and memory as well as to safeguard the future.

By collecting the words, stories and 'memories of sweets' of his Syrian friends on postcards, the artist and designer Benjamin Loyauté is helping to protect a culture whose imprint forms a protective armour. The installation is a fictio-functional experience in which the word objects have a perlocutionary power.

The world is changing, as are the problems conferred to design. Using both his more personal projects and those developed by Ateliers Integral in Paris and Zurich as starting points, Ruedi Baur will analyse the new requirements of readability, orientation, scene setting, those relating to identification, exchange, sharing, as well as to participation, good neighbourliness, the vision of a desired future and making it happen.

He will also present the various studies that he is developing in a variety of European schools.
